The highest waterfall in the Coast Range lies just a mile and a half off Highway 101, at the end of a hike so short, you

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can check this worthwhile Oregon landmark off your life list in about 15 minutes (or less, if you're quick). The 319-foot-tall falls slice through a towering Sitka spruce forest, alongside what might be the most heavily moss-laden trees in our considerably moss-laden state. Make the trip on a late August day, when the shady quartermile stroll is a soothing salve to summer heat. Turn east on Munson Creek Road-road signs help guide the way. Proceed two

Perhaps that's because Manzanita has been blessed by the gods of both earth and sun: Locals claim that Neahkahnie Mountain somehow wards off the clouds, keeping their quiet oceanfront town bathed in light even when others are veiled in fog. Whether it's true or not hardly matters; after a day spent hiking to the edge of Bayocean Spit, when you've returned to Manzanita and ordered a glass of chardonnay, you too will be a believer.
